## DIFFERENT TYPES OF NEWSPAPER

A newspaper is a collection of articles about current affairs (=current events) written by journalists or reporters. The editor reads each article and decides what news stories to publish in which section of the newspaper. Sometimes a particular journalist is associated with his or her own column, and writes on a given theme each day or each week. In this case, he or she is known as a columnist.

DISTRIBUTION: Most nations have at least one newspaper that circulates throughout the whole country: a **national newspaper**, as contrasted with a **local newspaper** which serves a city or a region. In the United Kingdom, there are numerous national newspapers, including <u>The Independent</u>, <u>The Times</u>, <u>The Daily Telegraph</u>, <u>The Guardian</u>, <u>The Observer</u>, <u>The Daily Mail</u>, <u>The Sun</u>, <u>The Daily Express</u> and <u>The Daily Mirror</u>. In the United States and Canada, there are **few** truly national newspapers, with the notable exceptions of <u>The Wall Street Journal</u> and <u>USA Today</u> in the US, and <u>The Globe and Mail</u> and <u>The National Post</u> in Canada. Large **metropolitan newspapers** with large **distribution networks** such as <u>The New York Times</u> and <u>The Washington Post</u> can fill the role of national newspapers.

A daily newspaper is issued every day. Sunday editions of daily newspapers (such as <u>The Sunday Telegraph</u> and <u>The Sunday Mirror</u> in the United Kingdom) tend to be larger and include more specialized sections and "free gifts", but they also cost more. Most daily newspapers are published in the morning. Afternoon or evening papers such as <u>The Evening Standard</u> target commuters and office workers. Weekly and monthly newspapers also exist.



FORMATS: There are two main newspaper **formats**: the largeformat **broadsheet** and the more compact **tabloid**. Broadsheets tend to be more seriously political, economic and business news-oriented, whereas tabloids exploit celebrity news and sensationalism. They have shorter, less complex articles on a wide range of less serious **topics**.

CONTENTS: The day's main story is prominent on the **front page**. Different types of **features** include: **national or international news**, **political news**, **business news**, **regional news**, **entertainment news**, **health**, **science**, and **technology**. There is also usually a **sports section** on the **back page** and a **weather forecast**. There may also be a **horoscope** ("**the stars**" – not to be confused with celebrities!), **travel news**, and a **fun page** with quizzes, games and comics.
